

FROM THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S DESK

We have had a great start to the school year and I am amazed that the first 5 weeks have already gone by so quickly. Something new for this year is that parents and students will be able to access their grades and various other types of information through our School Tool student/parent information system. Teachers have been trained and plans are in the works to get information to parents and students on how to use the system shortly. This system has replaced the Engrade system that was used previously by several of our staff members. The School Tool system will be available for use by all teachers. As a district we are excited to have this opportunity for parents and students to keep track of their progress throughout each marking period. I believe it will help bridge the gap between home and school allowing the two to work better together toward finding success for all of our students.

Another School Tool program that we are beginning to use this month is the attendance RoboCall system. When your child is absent from school you will receive an automated call informing you of their absence. Since the calls will go out at the same time each day, parents will be informed much earlier in the day in case there any discrepancies and it will also free up valuable time for the school nurse. The system will automatically call the primary parent that is on file from the emergency contact information that you provided earlier This system is used in other this year. districts in our area and has been well received by parents and staff. I look forward to adding this technology to assist parents and our staff to help ensure students are safe and their attendance is being tracked accurately. The RoboCall system will not be used if your child has become ill while at school. The school nurse will continue to make those types of calls to parents. As with any new technology, I anticipate an occasional glitch in the system, I do ask that parents call to inform us of any problems that they may encounter.

Now that the school year is under way... the following are some ideas for you to support your child's learning.

What is Happening in Fourth Grade?

It is hard to believe that we are already a month and half into school. In ELA, the $4^{\rm th}$ graders have been working on close reading text to help them better understand what they read, writing short responses and writing paragraphs. Our first unit of study will be the Haudenosaunee People (Iroquois). During this unit we will read a variety of text about the Haudenosaunee People. We will also do LOTS of writing to show our understanding of the text.

The unit also focuses on many character education pieces including the CARES word of the month, Cooperation. Some of the character education lessons will be about being assertive, instead of a follower, doing what is right even when an adult is not around, following rules, and community building.

In math, the students have been working on fluency with multiplication facts, solving word problems and fractions.

AFTER SCHOOL PROGRAM

McGraw Elementary After-school Program is up and running! There are 80 students participating and the first few weeks have gone quickly. The philosophy of the program is to engage young people in enriching activities growing their desire for life-long learning. The daily schedule allows time for movement, relaxation, homework help and inspiring activities. From 3:05pm - 3:30 pm students gather in the cafeteria. They are assigned to tables according to grade level. This year our 4th and 5th graders pass out snack to Kindergarten through 3rd grades and help them as needed. This encourages positive interactions among all grade levels, cooperation and responsibility. A cooperative environment helps to promote our new Character Education Program CARES Cooperation, Assertion, Responsibility, Empathy and Self-Control. From 3:30pm - 4:15pm students go with an afterschool teacher to a classroom where they receive support to begin, and sometimes complete their homework. Around 4:15pm teachers shift from homework to an enrichment activity. These can include, but are not limited to, board games, technology, playground, physical activities in the gym, special programming, a community project and more. At 4:50pm students who do not ride the bus gather in the cafeteria with their belongings and wait to be called from the office when a caregiver arrives. For safety purposes, there is only one point of access for caregivers. They go to the office to sign children out at anytime during the program. At 5:00pm the program ends and children who ride the bus are dismissed. The after-school program runs Monday thru Thursday. There is NO after-school on Fridays. This month there will be no after-school on Halloween, Monday October 31st. It has been such a pleasure for me to see all the smiling faces every day. Empty Bowls - The 11th Annual Empty Bowls Fundraiser will be held again this year on Saturday, October 29th at 6:00 PM at the Center 4 the Arts in Homer. Tickets are a \$35.00 minimum donation for a handmade bowl. This event is an international grassroots effort to fight hunger and was created by the Imagine Render Group. Potters, craftsman, educators, and students work with the community to create beautiful and unique hand crafted bowls. These bowls will then be used to eat out of that night for dinner and then will be taken home with the buyer as a reminder about world hunger. The food for the dinner is donated by several local restaurants and musical entertainment will also be provided. All proceeds go to Cortland's Loaves and Fishes program to provide food for those in need. McGraw Art students each made two beautiful handmade pottery bowls, one to donate and one to keep. <u>Art Club</u> — We have a HUGE club this year of 40 members!!! The Art Club met for our first workshop on October 14th. We made a variety of autumn themed projects such as decorated wreaths, mason jars, stained glass, candle holders, and wooden decorations. Our next workshop will be December 2nd.

WATER QUALITY TESTING

Proudly our district has always chosen to take the proactive approach when it handles the health and safety of the students and staff at McGraw Central Schools. During the 2010 Building Project a majority of the plumbing & fixtures were upgraded to align with the federal guidelines of being lead-free. This past summer we tested various sinks and drinking fountains for water quality. Of the 100+ tests, only four sinks came back with levels slightly above the action level required by the DOH. The fixtures were replaced, labeled, and have been retested.

On September 6 NYS signed into law requiring all possible drinking water sources with student access be tested for the presence of lead to a limit of 15 ppb (parts per billion). We were working with the county DOH to ensure all the proper procedures and regulations are followed. On September 29th the remainder of the testing was performed in all the facilities, and we are awaiting results. Once results are back, we will create an action plan to correct any issues. We will continue to communicate with you on our findings and actions, including taking any faucets or fountains offline for drinking water.

We will also be continuing to ensure the water quality is up to the new standards by having a testing schedule that ensures all locations will be tested at least every five years.
