FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT'S DESK

Dear McGraw Families:

The school year has just passed the halfway mark and our students constantly continue to amaze and impress.

Our youngest students are working on vocabulary and completing research studies on animal behaviors such as hibernation. Kindergarteners are quick to share some interesting facts about different types of bears. Exceptional creative writing projects adorn the 1^{st} and 2^{nd} grade hallways with specific goals in mind to address compound words, appropriate grammar, expressive adjectives, and persuasive writing techniques. This is all leading to a solid foundation for our students who will soon be participating in the state examinations.

Grades 3-8 will take the NYS English Language Arts Assessments on March 28-30, and the NYS Mathematics Assessments on May 2-4. These exams have faced a great deal of scrutiny over the past few years. The New York State Commissioner of Education, Mary Ellen Elia, has listened to our concerns and addressed them since her arrival last year. The assessments are shorter and untimed, Special Education accommodations are able to be fully implemented this year, and teacher access to past and practice test questions has been improved. Educators' input is being utilized for building appropriate test questions and tasks.

We strive to have full participation in the assessments to once again utilize these exams as originally intended. Teachers may use the results to help with individualized instruction and placement decisions. Quality data sets with greater participation assist us with our programmatic reviews and guide our decisions for necessary changes and improvements. With over a 95% participation rate, schools will no longer be automatically placed on Local Assistance Plans for excessive opt-outs. This will provide us more time for quality instruction and avoid this time consuming process. We encourage all of our families to take part in the program this year so that we may make better informed instructional decisions for our curriculum planning and implementation. *continued on page 11*

From the Elementary Principal's Desk

McGraw Pre-K Classroom to open September 2017!!

We would like to thank the Board of Education for approving the development and implementation of a McGraw Elementary Pre-Kindergarten classroom! Our administration and teachers recognized the value of having a preschool program on-site and they put together a Pre-K Committee consisting of administrators, primary and intermediate teachers, special education teachers, and reading teachers. The committee met several times to discuss if the community sees a need for a Pre-K class, why it is needed, if it is possible, where it will be, and if it is a "go," when will it begin?

We strive to support open communication with our community and to hear the suggestions and concerns of our students' families. In order to respect that relationship, a parent survey was conducted at our Fall Open House. That survey clearly reflected McGraw parents' beliefs that a Pre-K would be a welcomed and valued addition to our elementary school.

Why is a McGraw Pre-K so valuable within our own elementary building? There will be many advantages for our students with the implementation of this program that include, but are not limited to: the opportunity to be introduced early to the McGraw Elementary school structure and setting; exposure to early literacy and math skills by a teacher that can collaborate with their future teachers, providing consistency and congruence; access to peers and early socialization; play and exploration in a familiar setting; and experience building relationships with other adults and peers.

After the Pre-K committee presented its findings to the Board of Education in December, we were given approval to start preparation and the committee continues to meet in order to make this happen.

The Pre-K classroom will be located in the primary wing of the elementary school, right next to the Kindergarten classrooms. Registration will begin in March, with a class limit of 15 students (one teacher and one paraprofessional.) If the registered number of students exceeds the available spaces, we will need to determine if we will go up to the state limit of 18 students in a class. The first McGraw Pre-K classroom will be ready in the fall of 2017.

In order for students to be eligible to attend this Pre-K classroom they must be 4 years old before December 1st, and it must be noted that, due to laws and regulations, district transportation can only be given to children four years old and older. Attendance will be monitored. All students involved in the program will be assessed using various screenings, such as the DIAL-4 (Developmental Indicators for the Assessment of Learning) to monitor their progress and readiness for school.

Please note that this program will not replace the Head Start classroom. Head Start is a part of the Cortland County Community Action Program, and they rent space from our district. Head Start is an integral program at McGraw and has many important opportunities for the families and students that they enroll. It is the wish of the McGraw School District that students who ARE eligible for Head Start enroll with them and take advantage of all they have to offer.

From the High School Principal's Desk

Once again, after Christmas break we began implementing the middle school character education program. There are six weeks to the program, with each week focusing on a different "pillar of character." The following character traits were focused on: Responsibility, Respect, Caring, Fairness, Trustworthiness and Citizenship.

All teachers who have middle school students received a packet with character cards to reward students who have gone above and beyond to exhibit the various character traits. Students who exhibited these traits and received a card also had the opportunity to receive prizes in the main office (motivational pencils, various school supplies, snacks and books). The prizes were all purchased through generous donations from local and area businesses. Our local businesses and those in the surrounding area are always generous to our students and our school programs. Before beginning the program it was stressed to staff members that students must earn this recognition and that rewards should not be given because a student is well behaved and just a good student. Students have been recognized for various things, i.e. turning in money that was found in the hallway, volunteering to help a classmate that was struggling with an assignment, comforting a classmate that was upset, reporting incidents, etc. Many of our students at all grade levels exhibit these characteristics on a daily basis, but I believe that when this type of behavior is recognized rather than assuming that it should just happen, it is contagious to those around and becomes the "norm" rather than isolated incidences.

The mid-year point of this school year has already been reached. The second half of the school year seems to go by more quickly with the announcement of the Senior Class academic top ten, gearing up for State and Regents exams, our spring musical production, concerts, final plans for trips and various other class activities and sporting events. There has been a slight change in the timing of state exams this year to give students and teachers a small break in-between with the Grades 3-8 ELA being held in March, Math in May and Science in May and June. Hopefully the breaks between the exams will take some of the stress away from students so they can focus and do well on each exam.

2016 Annual Report



The Lamont Memorial Free Library provided great patron service for 2016. The library restarted children's programs held at the Lamont Library. The summer reading programs held at the McGraw Community Center had excellent attendance, because of collaboration with the McGraw Elementary Summer School program. The new monthly teen program continued to grow over the year providing fun activities for the youth of the community. Additional adult programs and the Holiday Open House offered more opportunities for the community to enjoy the library and the many services it provides.

In March, the library welcomed the library's new Children's Coordinator, Christa Boice. Christa presented the weekly Preschool Storytime, and the summer reading activities for the age group $Pre-K - 5^{th}$ grade. The library's Teen Coordinator, Rebecca Cornell, continued the monthly teen program, Kreative Kidz, and the summer reading activities for the age group 6-10th grade. The craft program continued to provide community members the opportunity to learn new craft skills and visit with fellow crafters. New this year was the Knit & Crochet Group. The group is open to all ages and skill levels. Carrie Kluge volunteered her time to help and guide participants through their projects.

This year the library received a Community Arts Grant from the Arts Council in the amount of \$1,550 which helped to fund four special programs enhancing our summer reading program: "On Your Mark, Get Set...Read!" the Merry-Go-Round Youth Theatre, Robert Rivest, Laurie MacIntosh and Debbie O'Carroll. The special programs were held at the McGraw Community Center. One hundred five children, thirty-four young adults and fifteen adults registered for the summer reading program. Total attendance for all of the summer reading programs was four hundred nine.


