**SUBJECT:** Fire Code Clarification

In continuation of our efforts to enforce the Fire Code consistently among our districts, I have received clarification from Dave Clapp, Fire Safety Coordinator, SED Facilities Planning, on the issue of wires, hooks and clips used to display student artwork in classrooms.

Wires suspended below a classroom ceiling for the purpose of hanging student artwork are acceptable provided that they comply with the following:

1. Do not present an entanglement or entrapment hazard for individuals walking through the room, i.e. wires maintained 7 feet or higher in an aisle way;
2. Do not obstruct the view to the Rescue Window or any exit door;
3. Are not hung from the light fixtures;
4. Are not fastened to a drop ceiling grid or into ceiling tiles.

It was further communicated to me that student artwork can be regarded as a temporary decoration, versus a permanent item, i.e. curtains, drapes, hangings and other decorative items, and as such would not need to be fire resistant or non-combustible.

Items intended to be permanent and suspended from walls or ceilings would have to be non-combustible or fire-treated. Permanent two-dimensional posters and paper directly attached to a classroom wall are not subject to this provision.

Additionally, I recommend that wires not be hung in front of or across the classroom door and that adequate clearance in front of the door is maintained, i.e. 8 feet. To avoid any entanglement or entrapment potential, wires should not be criss-crossed or run perpendicular to each other. If items are limited in size to 11 inches long (typical length of a standard sheet of paper) that would serve to prevent conditions where rescue windows or exit doors are obstructed and keep the overall load within reason.
